The approach of the government is very lopsided and roughshod when it comes to providing basic education to the under privileged children. The hype and hoopla created by Right to education bill'08 will prove to be a lip service rather than its gain percolating to the masses. Government has enough money to pay the enhanced, salary as

recommended by 6th pay commission to its employees but when funds are required for education, the government develops cold feet, citing resources crunch. The nations who have progressed or are in the developing stage spend a high quotient of their

GDP for education but here in India, we have funds available for every thing but for education.

The state with the lowest literacy rate has the highest population, U.P. followed by Bihar. Kerala with full literacy has excelled itself in family planning. If this realization had dawned upon our political establishment after independence the silhouette of the Indian republic would have been different and we would have been known by our prosperity rather than by our population. Even now, despite tall claims made by the government there are villages where there are no schools up to 3-4 kms distance and if at all they are, there is shortage of teachers, staff, no toilets, no drinking water, it's a national shame. The three things which determine the well-being and prosperity of a nation are - Health, Education and Infrastructure. Ironically we don't even qualify in either of the three.

These are the post millennium times, though literature does exist but a large part of it has been taken over by the media. We see, we observe and we then involuntarily copy from it. In our continuing effort to spread value information we are covering a series of articles by Dr.Vivek Agarwal on the effects media is having on the young generation.

“Media”--- The boon or The bane???

(Part- 1)

Children and adolescents spent a lot of their time watching television, movies, playing videogames and using computer and internet. Although, media is a useful tool to educate and socialize the society, concern has been raised by parents and professionals about the impact of media on children because of the extensive research reports of gradual harmful effects. Although the concern about the impact of violent television on children was first raised in 1950s, now it has become a public health issue in western countries. It has become imperative for the parents to understand the effect of media exposure on children in order to understand behavior problems.

Violence

Most of the research focuses on television (TV) because children spend most of the media time with TV. Average American child spend more than 21 hours per week watching TV. TV viewing also starts earliest beginning even before 2 years of age. Recently surveys are being carried out on other Medias also. Numerous studies have documented the multiple effects of television on children ranging from cognitive development, obesity, aggressive behavior and violence, drug abuse, suicide and sexual activity. National television violence study was carried out to understand the content of American television. It examined more than 10,000 hours of programming across a variety of channels at all hours of day from 1994-1997. It showed that there was an

alarming amount of violence per year with 61% of the shows containing violence of some kind. While 26% of violent interactions involved the use of weapons, 38% of violent interactions showed on apparent pain remorse, critics or punishment to the violence. Almost 75% of the violent acts show no remorse, criticism or punishment to the violence. To the contrary humor was associated with the violence in 41% of the acts. Presentations of the violence differed according to the type of program. Movies were far more likely to present violence in realistic settings, whereas TV serial violence was not as explicit or graphic. Among violent programs only 15% carried any sort of advisory or content code and such ratings seen to attract more 10-14 years old male viewers. The study concluded that television violence contributes to antisocial effects on viewers. The prime effects seen were-

1. Learning aggressive behavior and attitudes
2. Desensitization to violence
3. Far of being victimized by violence

It also concluded that not all violence posed same degree of risk. It was also analyzed that what contextual factor will have probability of generating the above three effects observed. Social science research rated attractive perpetrator; presence of weapon and humor as associated with learning aggression, graphic violence and realistic violence associated with generating fear; and humor and graphic violence associated with desensitization.

An epidemiological research over 20 years has examined the effect of childhood exposure to TV after 10-15 years of time lag. It examined the homicide rates in South Africa following the introduction of TV in 1975. The homicide rates had reached 5.8 per 100,000 in 1989 as compared to 2.5 per 100,000 in 1974. The author although acknowledge the TV as one factor, hypothesized that if TV had never been developed, there would be 10,000 fewer homicides; 70,000 fewer rapes and 700,000 fewer injurious assaults in United States.

Examination of 28 research reports on children exposed to media violence and subsequently observed in unconstrained social interaction showed that the exposure to media violence increased the aggressive interactions with the strangers, classmates and friends. In a review of 217 studies from 1957 to 1990 showed that TV violence had a strong and significant correlation with aggressive behavior regardless of age. The greatest effect was seen in pre-school children. The effect was slightly higher in males than females. Recent research has looked for association between trauma symptoms and TV watching and noted that 75% children reported exposure to violence at moderate to high levels. 10% reported to have counseling for negative effects. Symptoms reported were bad dreams and nightmares, anxious feelings, afraid of being alone, withdrawing from friends and missing school.
